- Choose captive-bred versus wild-caught pets
- Purchase pets from reputable sources and ask lots of questions
- Never release a pet into the wild
- Avoid pets with aggressive temperaments

Animals that are at the highest risk of extinction and are extremely invasive. They also pose significant health threats to people and other animals.
